Jac Christis died past weekend.

Jac is not known in the foreign discussions on workplace innovation. He is a giant in the Dutch discussions on quality of work and modern sociotechnical thinking.


He combined philosophy, sociology and practice. He applied his thoughts in many companies and sectors. Interestingly, he lived by one core advice from Adorno, one of the main thinkers of the original Frankfurter Schüle. Adorno said that scientific practice should not be fooled by the demands of philosophy. Jac rephrased this by saying that practicians should not be fooled by science, either.

This thought is also central to my talk today. I hope with this reference, but also with the perspective I sketch, that I can help stress the importance of Jac, not only to the Dutch discussions, but also to the 'human-centric' debate at the European and world scale. His thoughts help underpin what is needed to make the European workplace a core strength in the global competition.

Washington Consensus (Williamson, 1990)	London Consensus (Besley et al., 2025)
Production efficiency is core, with separation of efficiency and distribution. Make the pie bigger, all is money.	It's not just the money: wellbeing is the key. The distribution of self-worth, respect, social status, and public recognition matter a great deal.
Liberalisation, deregulation and privatisation were supposed to ensure that 'prices are right' and private agents can respond to those price signals	Growth matters but so does place. Creative destruction is central
Responsible monetary and fiscal policies needed to reduce macroeconomic volatility.	Building resilience: government as insurer of last resort
Fix the economy and politics will get sorted along the way	There is no good economics without good politics . Institutions matter. Policy needs to be inclusive and sustainable
The state is confined to policing, defence, basis education and health	A capable state : the essential complement for everything. The state needs to be built. Industrial policy requires an activist state




Industry 5.0 sets new values for production. Companies need to be aware of their externalities. 'Good production' is aware of human-centricity, sustainability, and resilience.










Note: North Pacific refers to region 20-60°N and 140-240°E



The policy problem: perception






Overcoming changes in policy perspectives, perceptions of managers requires time. We need to build on the 'London consensus' and show the value of the European Social Model and Industry 5.0.






Is an innovative workplace (Aghion & Van Reenen, 2025)

Allows to get grip on technology, even Al.



US: mortality rates of non-Hispanic whites are up since 2000, accelerating after 2011


US: deaths by despair increase in same cohort. Insecurity leads to misery US: 'exclusive education leads to loss of a lot of 'Einsteins'

Denmark: impacts of insecurity has no effect on mortality (Danes live longer), flexicurity increases productivity

Finland: inclusive education expands number of 'Einsteins' Marie Curies'
